Turning taxes into tuition with the Catholic Community Foundation

The Catholic Community Foundation has established The Angel Scholarship Fund as a brand new opportunity to support our Catholic Schools and students in the Diocese of Cleveland. It is possible to "turn tax dollars into tuition" by making a charitable contribution to the Angel Scholarship Fund in 2022 that is eligible for a 100% tax credit on the donor's 2022 State of Ohio income tax return. The maximum credit amount is currently \$750 (\$1500 if married filing jointly, where each spouse donates \$750). Donors can make undesignated contributions to the Angel Scholarship Fund, and the Angel Scholarship Fund can then award to any eligible student from any Catholic school, or donors can make a contribution designated to benefit students at a particular school. The Angel Scholarship Fund, like any SGO, is required to prioritize "low income" (under 300% of the poverty threshold) recipients, but otherwise the law does not place limits on which K-12 students can be served or the number of scholarships that can be awarded. This program holds tremendous potential for bolstering our efforts to ensure the viability of our Catholic schools and has the potential to benefit every Catholic school in the diocese.

All students that apply are eligible to receive an Angel Scholarship. While applicants that are under 300% of the poverty threshold (in 2021-2022 this is \$79,500 for a family of four) will be prioritized, applicants that are over this threshold are also eligible for an Angel Scholarship, based on availability of funds.

As we waited to celebrate Christmas and the birth of Baby Jesus, there was magic happening in our school building. Our 8th Grade students held their annual Breakfast with Santa, featuring a sausage and pancake breakfast in two sold out seatings. The class served as elves and were assigned very specific tasks which included greeting and seating guests, waiting on tables, selling baked goods, cleaning up, and of course, welcoming Santa! Many of our 8th Grade parents volunteered to help that Saturday morning as well as my husband, Mr. Gunn, and Mr. Sevier, all of whom came in extra early before the students to begin the cooking in the kitchen. Watching one family after the next place their children in Santa's arms and capture the moment with a photograph was nothing short of exciting. It stirred many memories of when we had taken our own sons to St. Mark's Breakfast with Santa many years ago. I believe traditions like these are important because they provide a sense of belonging and meaning to our lives. As you know, the Holocaust was a government organized persecution of 6 million Jews and 5-7 million other people determined to be inferior or different between 1933-1945. Our children learn about the Holocaust in Social Studies and Reading, so it was very fitting for them to experience the passionate stories of those who had family living this first-hand during this relevant time in history. Rachel shared personal stories of how her grandmother was forced to walk barefoot in below zero weather to go to work at the tender age of 14. Learning about the Holocaust is an opportunity to unpack and analyze the decisions and actions taken or not taken by a range of people in a time of crisis. It is an opportunity to raise awareness of how prejudice, stereotyping, and racism affects us today. Many thanks to Mrs. Riordan for arranging this visit for our students.

The children spent a great deal of time practicing their lines and learning new songs as the performance time neared. Saint of the Week

Saint John was one of the Twelve, part of Jesus' inner circle, among the few that witnessed the Transfiguration, the raising of Jarius' Daughter, and the Agony in the garden at Gethsemane. He and his brother James were the sons of Zebedee and Salome. When Jesus called them, they left their father mending nets and followed him. Jesus called the brothers "Boanerges," meaning "sons of thunder" – they were passionate in their faith and Jesus had to rebuke them for their fiery zeal on more than one occasion. John, the younger brother, possibly the youngest disciple, was the only one present at Jesus' death.

Saint John the Apostle is traditionally thought to be the author of the fifth Gospel, the three Epistles of John, and the Book of Revelation. However, there has been some debate among scholars from antiquity to the present. Tradition also gives him the title Beloved Disciple and John's Gospel sees him seated next to Jesus at the last supper and the one to whom Jesus gives the care of Mary at the crucifixion. Although Church tradition says that John survived the other disciples, living a long life, much of it is steeped in myth and legend. Some say he retired to Ephesus after the crucifixion with Mary and remained there until he died. But in other traditions he is more active. For a time he remained in Jerusalem with the other disciples, then founded churches in Asia Minor. In a legend of his persecution, during the reign of the Emperor Domitian, John is taken to Rome and thrown into a cauldron of boiling oil but preserved from death. He is then exiled to the island of Patmos where the Book of Revelation was written. Most accounts agree that after his exile and the Assumption of Mary he returned to Ephesus where he died sometime after 98, during the reign of the Emperor Trajan.
