


St. Mark Catholic Church

PRINCIPAL NEWS

This past week, we celebrated Literature week, a week devoted to reading and writing. We had some special visitors, members of our Cleveland Police Department, in our building, They shared the book Awesome Adventures with Caddie the Rescue Dog written by Natalie McCurry, a retired police officer, with our students and then spent some time answering questions the children had. Apollo, an emotional support dog for the CPD, came along with Officer Chris, who explained Apollo's role. Officer Chris explained to the students the meaning behind Apollo's name," Light in Darkness" because of the support he brings to officers when dealing with some difficult situations. When Apollo was first brought to the CPD, he needed a name, so the officers were provided an opportunity to name him. One of our dads, Officer Lentz, submitted the name Apollo, which was chosen. A special thank you goes out to Officer Tom Ross for organizing this wonderful event with Mrs. Horning, our librarian, as well as to all the officers who came out, including our Commander Jarod Schlacht. Besides Commander Schlacht and Officer Ross, a special thank you goes out to Officer Reddy, Officer Caraballo, Officer Gomez, Officer Litton, and Officer Porter with Apollo. It was wonderful having them here in our school.

Some of our other activities held during Literature Week included DEAR Time- "Drop Everything and Read," as well as a visit from local artist George Woideck, from the Center for Art and Literacy, who read the children a book recommended by their classroom teacher and connected it to art. The students worked with different mediums such as clay, paper, and string.

We also had a "Dress as your Favorite Book or Character Day." I found it quite interesting to see the creative costumes that so many of our children and teachers wore. Miss Dunleavy was dressed as the lead character in the book If You Give a Mouse a Cookie by author Laura Nimeroff. Reading brings great pleasure in so many ways!

I can remember how daunting it was to read any of Shakespeare's plays back in high school because the vernacular was so difficult to understand as well as some of the themes. We have come a long way in education today because now our students in the 6th-8th Grades study the life of William Shakespeare and several of his plays. These plays are brought to life right in the classroom because of the Great Lakes Shakespearean actors who spend an entire week with our students, after the students have read Macbeth, Julius Caesar, and Romeo and Juliet in their reading classes. William Shakespeare contributed to the standardization of the English language in the 17th and 18th centuries because as his work gained importance, people began to recognize consistent spelling, compound words, and the addition of prefixes and suffixes to words already commonly used. He invented around 1700 words which we still use in everyday English today, words such as "generous, negotiate, and amazement." Shakespeare wrote about timeless themes such as life and death, youth versus age, love and hate, fate and free will, to name only a few. In an article written by Celtic English Academy, it states, "It truly is amazing that one person could have such an influence on a language. What Shakespeare has taught us is that success comes through being creative, playing with language, and finding new ways to communicate."

We had a great time celebrating Literature Week. I look forward to next year's already! It is such a delight to see children so excited about READING! Have a great week!
