

REFLECTION

Listen. Think. Act.

That is a mantra or slogan for many different groups. Some seek to battle prejudice and bias. Other groups hope to eliminate poverty or reduce crime. I have even found some companies use it as a way of increasing engagement among their employees. In a nutshell, it is about taking in what you have heard and then reflecting on it before you act. The most fruitful actions are those that take place after careful reflection.

This is an important thing to remember for those trying to live a stewardship way of life. If we are honest with ourselves, too often most of us jump to conclusions too quickly or act in ways that cause friction because we didn't really think about the consequences of our actions. We are moving too fast in a world that seems to be moving ever faster. When the shepherds came to visit Jesus, the newborn King, they told Mary everything that the angels had told them. Luke tells us that after hearing all this, she "kept all these things, reflecting on them in her heart." No response. No panic. No action. Her reflection was the appropriate response.

In this New Year, you and I would do well to remember this Gospel account of Mary, the Mother of God. Let us resolve to listen more, reflect often, and then act accordingly. We are called to use our gifts wisely, sowing them in good soil. If we just throw them out, allowing them to simply fall wherever they may, have we really used them for God's glory? We need to listen. Think. Then act.

Turning taxes into tuition with the Catholic Community Foundation

The Catholic Community Foundation has established The Angel Scholarship Fund as a brand new opportunity to support our Catholic Schools and students in the Diocese of Cleveland. It is possible to "turn tax dollars into tuition" by making a charitable contribution to the Angel Scholarship Fund in 2022 that is eligible for a 100% tax credit on the donor's 2022 State of Ohio income tax return. The maximum credit amount is currently \$750 (\$1500 if married filing jointly, where each spouse donates \$750). Donors can make undesignated contributions to the Angel Scholarship Fund, and the Angel Scholarship Fund can then award to any eligible student from any Catholic school, or donors can make a contribution designated to benefit students at a particular school. The Angel Scholarship Fund, like any SGO, is required to prioritize "low income" (under 300% of the poverty threshold) recipients, but otherwise the law does not place limits on which K-12 students can be served or the number of scholarships that can be awarded. This program holds tremendous potential for bolstering our efforts to ensure the viability of our Catholic schools and has the potential to benefit every Catholic school in the diocese.

All students that apply are eligible to receive an Angel Scholarship. While applicants that are under 300% of the poverty threshold (in 2021-2022 this is \$79,500 for a family of four) will be prioritized, applicants that are over this threshold are also eligible for an Angel Scholarship, based on availability of funds.

As we celebrate the New Year, here are some thoughts from Rita Watson from her article titled," Ten Thoughts for Embracing a New Year of Serenity" of how to give it special meaning:

- Make a wish list that gives you purpose. Fill it with wishes for right now for yourself and people you love.
- Read children's books to enliven your imagination. "The Polar Express" will restore your belief in holiday magic.
- Let go of an angry heart. Forgive someone to refresh your soul.
- Take a nature walk to find little miracles in the song of a bird, beauty of a tree, clouds making shapes ranging from dragons to angels floating by.
- Write a love letter, a serious handwritten love letter, even if it takes a full week to complete.
- Listen to those in your life who may need you to step back, slow down, and be there for them. Then create uninterrupted alone times to share with them.
- Take a first step towards making a big dream come true.
- Start a gratitude book even if you can only think of one happy moment per day. Dr. Robert Emmons, UC Davis, explained in an interview that "Attitude change often follows behavior change. By living the gratitude that we do not necessarily feel, we can begin to feel the gratitude that we live."
- Open your heart to find love. The man who wrote a book titled Love, Dr. Leo Buscaglia, believed that we should all take a chance on love and express our feelings by saying the words to children, parents, friends, and spouses, "I love you."
- Practice acts of kindness.

I would like to express my sincere appreciation and gratitude to all of you for your kind expressions of sympathy over the loss of Dave Adams. Your prayers, your offers to stand his watch for our morning drop off, your coffee, your hugs, your baking for the wake, your presence during the wake and funeral, and your thoughts certainly helped all of us get through the days just prior to Christmas break. Your sympathy came through in so many ways and it was a true tribute to what St. Mark is- a community that truly cares about one another, a community that I am so proud to be a part of. The day following his death, one child after the other exited their cars in tears, and I could do nothing but hug them and love them and listen to them. But then I realized that these amazing children started doing the same for one another! The older students walked younger ones into the building and to their classrooms with arms wrapped around one another. Mr. Adams made a difference in their lives and ours, whether it was through his peanut butter yoga moves, his bad jokes, his belief in following rules, his kickball calls, his love for sports and how it affects children, the relationships created through his many years of coaching (my own sons included), the friendships formed through his involvement in many of our parish organizations, his love for travel, and the deep faith he had in our God. During Covid last year, he loved bringing the Eucharist to the classrooms; it was a privilege for him as a Eucharistic Minister of Holy Communion. He is missed but will not be forgotten. Mr. Adams was a good and faithful servant; one I am honored to call both friend and colleague.

I would like to take this opportunity to wish all of you a Happy New Year from all of us at St. Mark School. I thank you for the gift of your children, for your support, and for your prayers. You are in our prayers every day. May each of you have a blessed and heartwarming 2023!




