


St. Mark Catholic Church



Anything worth doing is worth doing well. This includes writing. The ability to write well is not entirely a gift; it does take work. Because the words we use to write with are the same words we think with, learning to write well has many ramifications. As we improve our ability to write, we improve our ability to think. This empowers us to become successful.


Employers today cite "Communication Skills" as one of the most important traits in the hiring process. In society today, most of our writing occurs electronically through emails, instant messaging, blogging, or texting. Much of the information that shapes our lives is written down, so it is necessary that children develop a sense of what good writing entails-especially in using correct grammar- my passion!

At St. Mark, our children develop excellent writing skills before they move into high school. As a faculty, we are invested in the belief that good writing needs to occur across the curriculum. Extended response answers are expected in all subjects. This means, for example, that in math, a child may have the correct answer, but must also be capable of explaining how the answer evolved through the written word.

It does my heart proud when students bring me drawings they created or pieces they have written. I proudly hang each one of them for a time in the hallway or in my office, and then I tuck them away for safe keeping. Just this week, one of our 4th Grade students, Adelaide C., found a most beautiful piece of reflective writing that I want to share with you, along with some spring art that she herself created:

Hate has four letters, but so does Love.
Enemies has seven letters, but so does Friends.
Lying has five letters, but so does Truth.
Failure has seven letters, but so does Success.
Cry has three letters, but so does Joy, and
Negativity has ten letters, but so does Positivity.
You always have a choice, so choose the Better Side of it.

Every year we have students submit either art or essay entries into LifeWorks Ohio Respect Life Contest. Students are challenged to reflect upon God's precious gift of life as well as a specific Bible theme. The theme this year was "We must consider how to rouse one another to love and good works." Gospel Meditation Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

Recently I was with my little dog Libby at a retreat center in the Arizona desert. I sat in a chair near a ravine filled with shrubs. Unbeknownst to me, Libby wandered down there and disappeared. Suddenly an animal's wild shriek erupted from the area. Without thinking, I bolted down into the ravine fully expecting to see coyotes, javelinas, or rattlesnakes. I didn't care. I desperately wanted to get Libby out of there, without any self-regard. Before I could face whatever danger lay hidden, my dog blissfully trotted out from an entirely different area, utterly unaware that I had (quite heroically) just placed my life on the line.

When the adrenaline wore off, I thought to myself: how far would I have been willing to go to save her? I don't know. But I do know, if I had literally died, my friends and family would have certainly thought me insane for dying for a dog. No offense, Libby.

How passionately Jesus wants us to know him and his willingness to die for us! This week he says, "I know my own and my own know me," and "I lay down my life for the sheep." Here we encounter an insanely excessive love for us. Christianity is a relationship and not simply a religion or ethical code. In Jesus, God rescues and saves us. He laid down his life for you and me — and he has taken it up again. So often we are like Libby — blissfully ignorant of the reality of both our spiritual danger and his saving love. This Easter season, the risen Jesus calls us to be more conscious than ever before about his love. He never ceases to lay down his life for us.
