General Audience of Pope Francis, on 16 October 2024

Cycle of Catechesis. The Spirit and the Bride. The Holy Spirit guides the people of God towards Jesus our hope. 9. "I believe in the Holy Spirit". The Holy Spirit in the faith of the Church

With today's catechesis, we will move on from what the Holy Spirit revealed to us in the Holy Scripture to how He is present and active in the life of the Church, in our Christian life.

In the first three centuries, the Church did not feel the need to give an explicit formulation of her faith in the Holy Spirit. For example, in the Church's most ancient Creed, the socalled Symbol of the Apostles, after proclaiming: "I believe in God the Father almighty, Maker of heaven and earth, and in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord, who was born, died, descended into hell, rose again from the dead and ascended into heaven", adds: "I believe in the Holy Spirit" and nothing more, without any specification.

But it was heresy that drove the Church to define this faith. When this process began – with Saint Athanasius in the fourth century – it was precisely the experience she had of the sanctifying and divinizing action of the Holy Spirit that led the Church to the certainty of the full divinity of the Holy Spirit. This occurred during the Ecumenical Council of Constantinople in 381, which defined the divinity of the Holy Spirit with the well-known words we still repeat today in the Creed: "I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets".

To say that the Holy Spirit "is the Lord" was like saying that He shares the "Lordship" of God, that He belongs to the world of the Creator, not to that of creatures. The strongest affirmation is that He is due the same glory and adoration as the Father and the Son. It is the argument of equality in honour, dear to Saint Basil the Great, who was the main architect of that formula: the Holy Spirit is the Lord, He is God.

The Council definition was not a point of arrival, but of departure. And indeed, once the historical reasons that had obstructed a more explicit affirmation of the divinity of the Holy Spirit had been overcome, this was confidently proclaimed in the worship of the Church and in her theology. Saint Gregory of Nazianzus, in the aftermath of the Council, went on to state without hesitation: "Is the Holy Spirit then God? Certainly! Is He consubstantial? Yes, if He is true God" (*Oratio* 31, 5.10).

What does the article of faith we proclaim every Sunday at Mass say to us, believers of today: "I believe in the Holy Spirit"? In the past, it was mainly concerned with the statement that the Holy Spirit "proceeds from the Father". The Latin Church soon supplemented this statement by adding, in the Creed of the Mass, that the Holy Spirit proceeds "also from the Son". Since in Latin the expression "and from the Son" is called '*Filioque*', this gave rise to the dispute known by this name, which has been the reason (or pretext) for so many disputes and divisions between the Church of the East and the Church of the West. It is certainly not the case to address the issue here, which, moreover, in the climate of dialogue established between the two Churches, has lost the acrimony of the past and today allows us to hope for full mutual acceptance, as one of the main "reconciled differences". I like to say this: "reconciled differences". Among Christians there are many differences: he belongs to this school, that other one; this person is a Protestant, that person... The important thing is that these differences are reconciled, in the love of walking together.

Having overcome this obstacle, today we can value the most important prerogative for us that is proclaimed in the article of the Creed, namely that the Holy Spirit is "life-giving", the "giver of life". Let us ask ourselves: what life does the Holy Spirit give? At the beginning, in creation, the breath of God gives Adam natural life; the statue of mud is made "a living being" (cf. *Gen* 2:7). Now, in the new creation, the Holy Spirit is He who gives believers new life, the life of Christ, supernatural life, as children of God. Paul can exclaim: "The law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus has set me free from the law of sin and death" (*Rom* 8:2).

In all of this, where is the great and consoling news for us? It is that the life given to us by the Holy Spirit is eternal life! Faith frees us from the horror of having to admit that everything ends here, that there is no redemption for the suffering and injustice that reign sovereign on earth. Another of the Apostle's words assures us of this: "If the Spirit of Him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, He who raised Christ Jesus from the dead will give life to your mortal bodies also through His Spirit who dwells in you" (*Rom* 8:11). The Spirit dwells in us, He is within us.

Let us cultivate this faith also for those who, often through no fault of their own, are deprived of it and are unable to give meaning to life. And let us not forget to thank Him, who with His death, obtained this inestimable gift for us!



PARISH GRADE SCHOOL

As we continue on into the history of St. Mark, now in the 70's, we had a new principal, Sr. Mildred Baker. Sr. Mildred was principal from 1967-1979. Sr. Mildred was interviewed about 15 years ago and shared these memories of St. Mark:

- All of the families in the parish helped each other.
- Church was on 1st floor and the Kindergarten was in the back of the church.
- Second floor had classrooms on one side and the tech. lab was the band room.
- The teachers were strict but very kind to students. They believed kids should always have a very good early education for high school.
- They used the social hall for gym class and on nice days the kids went outside.
- The nuns lived in the convent and got food from a bakery that gave day-old goods, from people in the parish, and from the mother house items from their farm.
- The students carried their books in yellow plastic bags.
- Started football, basketball, and baseball in 1968.
- Kids From St. Christopher and St. Marks had playoffs.
- Impett was a nice playground where the football team practiced.

Several of her former students were present during the interview as well, including my brother and his friends. Every one of them spoke so highly of Sr. Mildred and the other sisters, who were tough but fair- even when her "boys" were up to their shenanigans!

Some other facts include:

- There was no gym or Community Center.
- Phys. Ed. classes were still held in the Social Hall.
- The Computer Lab was called "The Reading Room".
- The classrooms did not go by numbers; they were named after saints.
- The current Room 9 was the library.
- The current library was a fifth grade classroom back then.
- The school day started at 8:30 and ended at 3:30.
- Girls had a choice of two different kinds of uniforms. They could wear the red plaid ones that we currently use, or they could wear the green and grey plaid ones too. Sixth through eighth graders also had to wear vests over white shirts with their uniform skirts.
- Boys had to wear ties from fifth to eighth grade. They could wear any shirt as long as it was a button down, with any pants.
- Students went to Mass every Friday.

If you look at the two photos of the classrooms, the lighting alone is greatly improved compared to what we had in classrooms back in the 70's. For that matter, today's classroom lighting is greatly improved from what it was just last year!

Sr. Mildred passed away a few years ago, and several St. Mark alumni attended her funeral in Michigan. What a powerful influence she was on so many. Fr. Casper Heimann was named pastor of St. Mark between 1969-1978 and was very supportive of the sisters and the school.

Priesthood Sunday, celebrated nationwide on the last Sunday of October each year, is a special day to honor the Priesthood in the United States. It is a call for parishioners to honor Christ as Priest and the men who were called to be his priests on earth. It is a day set aside for Catholic parishes throughout the United States to show support for their priests with prayer, celebration, and dialogue. Continue to pray that the Holy Spirit inspires more men to discern this call of service because the role of the priest in the life of the Church is a central one. The men who answer the call to priesthood are special indeed, and they are working harder than ever before. I cannot say thank you enough to Fr. Adam for the support he provides to our entire faculty and staff. He is there for us whenever needed, but allows us to do our jobs because he has both confidence and trust in us. Fr. Adam has already spent time in classrooms, instructing our children on a variety of religious topics or training them in the ministry as servers. Taking on two parishes is certainly not an easy task, but Fr. Adam is serving St. Mark and St. Mel well. In addition, he had been a great mentor for Fr. Michael Garvin. Fr. Gary equally deserves some recognition for the time he celebrates Mass with us, especially on weekends. He has been a great friend to Fr. Adam. As we celebrate Priesthood Sunday this year, I ask all of you to lift Fr. Adam up in prayer that as our servant-leader, he is given the strength to maintain this most holy vocation. Pray that the Holy Spirit may inspire more men to discern this call of service. Congratulations on this Priesthood Sunday, Father Adam and Fr. Gary, and thank you on behalf of your 418 children!
